THE LONG FAMILY

The LONG family came from Virginia. They were a prominent family there especially in several counties, among them Culpeper and Spotsylvania. These counties are located in north central Virginia and are adjacent and adjoin Orange Co. Culpeper County was formed in 1748 from Orange Co. and Orange Co. was formed in 1734 from Spotsylvania Co. in turn. Spotsylvania Co. was formed from Essex in 1720.

There were a number of LONGS in Virginia and Maryland as early as the middle 1600's. A number were found in the records of Spotsylvania Co. in the 1730's and 1740's. A WILLIAM and ELIZABETH LONG with children ALEXANDER, JOHN, WILLIAM, JR., were imported from Ireland in Orange Co. in July 1740. There were no LONGS on a tax list of Orange Co. in 1737-1739 but WILLIAM LONG (2) were listed there in 1749. In 1755 there was only one WILLIAM LONG listed there.

A WILLIAM LONG married Mary Hubbard in 1785 in York Co., Va. One married a Elizabeth Lewis in 1738 in Stafford Co. Eleanor Bolton in 1749 in Stafford Co. and Frances Stratton in Stafford Co. in 1756.

WILLIAM LONG was witness to a deed in 1740 in Spotsylvania Co. (Deed Book C). John Miller, Jr. of Saint Mary Parish Caroline Co. sold land to SAMUEL LONG of St. George Parish of Spotsylvania Co. (Deed Book C) in 1735. SAMUEL also witnessed a deed of Gift in 1736. WILLIAM LONG witnessed a will of George Goodloe in 1743 (Deed Book D). In 1742 Charles Filks Pigg sold land to BLOOMFIELD LONG of St. George Parish (Deed Book D), and in 1741 John Wells sold land to him. The land in the last case adjoined land BLOOMFIELD LONG already owned. In 1737, Abraham Mayfield sold land to BLOOMFIELD LONG of Essex Co., a blacksmith (Deed Book C). WILLIAM LONG witnessed a will in 1740 of Hugh Sanders of St. George Parish, and in 1743 of Diana Goodloe of same. In 1745 WILLIAM LONG and ANN his wife of Spotsylvania Co. sold land to Thomas Duerson of St. George Parish (Deed Book D.). In 1746 WILLIAM LONG witnessed a deed.

There was a will for a BRUMFIELD LONG in Orange Co. in 1779. There were wills for BENJAMIN in 1774 (intestate), BROMFIELD 1778 (same one?), and REUBEN LONG in Culpeper Co.

REUBEN LONG had children GABRIEL, EVANS, ANDERSON, NIMROD, FANNY (married Daniel Richardson), PEGGY (married Robert Kay), POLLY (married John Nash). The will was probated in Culpeper Co. in 1792. (Will Records, p. 52). His wife was Mary Harrison.

BRUMFIELD LONG, of St. Marks Parish, Culpeper Co. had sons JOHN, BRUMFIELD, REUBEN, GABRIEL, THOMAS and daughters Nancy Chisam, BETTY and MILLY LONG. His son BENJAMIN had a son BENJAMIN. The first had apparently already died. His wife was named SARAH LONG. The will was probated in 1786 in Culpeper Co. In another will (John Bond, 1756). John Bond (his wife Mary) included his son-in-law BENJAMIN LONG and his wife MARY and his grandson BLOOMFIELD LONG and his wife ELIZABETH in the will (Will Book B and C).

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GEORGE LONG and his wife REBECKAH had a land patent in Culpeper County (or probably recorded under Spotsylvania) in 1731. (Deed Books 304-07 and 7-18, 1751).

SAMUEL LONG died Feb. 14, 1739-40 and his will was probated in 1740. He had a brother JAMES LONG. The heirs were BROMFIELD LONG, his son and daughters MARY and ELIZABETH LONG.

In 1750, (will probated 1752) JOHN LONG of St. George's Parish, Spotsylvania Co. died and left his wife ELIZABETH and grandson John Hawkins and daughter Elizabeth Hawkins and granddaughter Elizabeth Hawkins. (Will Bk. B, p. 116).

RICHARD LONG died November 11, 1761 (will probated 1762) and left children GABRIEL LONG, JAMES, WILLIAM, ANDREW, REUBEN and JOHN. His wife was named ELIZABETH LONG. (Will Bk. D, p. 29)

In 1761 GEORGE LONG, of Fredericksburg, Spotsylvania Co. died and left a wife MARTHA, an infant child yet unchristened, and daughter ANN LONG. (Will Bk. D, p. 36).

ELIZABETH LONG the widow of JOHN died in 1760 (will probated 1764) (Will Bk. d, p. 166)

In the will of John Durrett (1775) he mentions his daughter ANN LONG and her children ELIZABETH, AGATHA, ANN, CATHREN, and SUSANNAH and grandson BRUMFIELD LONG. (as well as other children) (Will Bk. E, p. 107)

The will of John Apperson in 1786 mentions his son-in-law EVANS LONG and his daughter LUCY LONG. (Will Bk. E, p. 740)

In 1782, LAWRENCE LONG was a witness of a deed in which the grantor lived in Lincoln Co., Ky. (Deed Bk. K). In 1786, EVANS and LUCY LONG and RICHARD and FANNY LONG (among a group of others) had agreed to relinquish their claim in favor of other heirs of John Apperson decd. (Deed Bk. L).

In another land record, Patrick Donally and his wife Peggy and JOSHUA LONG sold land that BROOMFIELD LONG gave to his son REUBEN in 1746, and that REUBEN later gave back to BROOMFIELD and BROOMFIELD later gave it to his two daughters MARY and SARAH. (Deed Bk. N, 1792)

In Culpeper Co., BENJAMIN LONG married Polly Garratt (1792, p. 64); BROMFIELD LONG married Lettice Roach (1737, p. 51); JOHN LONG married Azubah Hawkins (1792, p. 64); THOMAS LONG married Nancy Shipp (1794, p. 63); THOMAS LONG married Polly Wharton (1799, p. 64); WILLIAM LONG married Mary Faulconer (1797, p. 64)

There were several LONG marriages in Orange Co. WEIR (WM.?) married Ann Sinnalt (?) in 1775, JAMES married Elizabeth Reynolds in 1784, HENRY married Lucy Monspoine in 1784, Thomas White married ELIZABETH LONG in 1789, and RICHARD LONG married Nancy Stevinson in 1796.

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Among early settlers of Virginia were DANIEL LONG 1682, who appears in the records of Isle of Wight Co., JAMES LONG (servant) was imported by Capt. Francis Epes in 1635, ANN LONG came in the "Africa" by Capt. Adam Thoroughgood, also in 1635.

In other land records of Spotsylvania Co., BLOOMFIELD LONG and MARY his wife and John Payne and Mary his wife sold land to Abraham Estes in 1759 (Deed Bk. E). JOHN LONG witnessed a deed in 1779, and was one of about 20 participants in a transaction in 1787 (Deed Bk. L). Charles Peasley and Susannah his wife sold land to JOHN LONG in Berkeley Parish of Spotsylvania Co. in 1789. JOHN LONG bought land from John Cammack and Ann his wife in same parish in 1791. In 1795, Ann Cammack, JOHN LONG and ANN his wife sold land to Moses Perry. The land was in Berkeley Parish, where JOHN LONG lived. (Deed Bk. O). JOHN LONG sold land to Thomas and Oliver Towles (mortgage) in 1796. JOHN LONG and ANN his wife sold land to JOSHUA LONG in 1797. It was where JOHN LONG then lived. (Deed Bk. O). In 1798, JOHN LONG sold land to Francis Turnley (Deed Bk. P).

In 1757, RICHARD LONG witnessed the will of Joseph Collins and William Smith. (Will Bk. E). He witnessed a deed in St. George Parish of Spotsylvania Co. in 1754 for Samuel Waggener (Deed Bk. E.) He witnessed a deed of 1788 with Hugh Roy (Deed Bk. M). In 1790, MARY LONG made a deed of gift of land to her two daughters MARTHA LONG and AUKEY LONG. Hugh Roy was a witness and the deed mentions "the maintenance of my son RICHARD LONG". (Deed Bk. M) In 1793 John Mastin and Ellender his wife sold land to RICHARD LONG of Spotsylvania Co. in Berkeley Parish. In 1795 Joseph Sams traded land with RICHARD LONG (Deed Bk. O)

In 1797, James Robbins and Elizabeth his wife sold land to JOSHUA LONG (Deed Bk. O), and RICHARD LONG and FANNY his wife sold land to John Smith of the same co. John Chew and Elizabeth his wife sold land to RICHARD LONG. RICHARD LONG and FANNY his wife sold land to PHILIP LONG (Deed Bk. P).

Thomas Minor was appointed guardian of ANN LONG orphan of GEORGE LONG in 1769. ANN LONG married John Leegan in 1799.

ARMISTEAD LONG witnesses a deed in 1794. EVANS LONG witnessed the will of John Apperson (who had a daughter LUCY LONG) in 1786. (Deed Bk. O) In 1759, GEORGE LONG was the administrator of the estate of Isiah Burns. In 1764, John Steward administrator of the estate of GEORGE LONG, decd. In 1799, JAMES LONG was appointed a guardian, JOHN D. LONG was a witness.

In 1781, JEREMIAH LONG was a witness to a deed of gift. In 1794, JOSHUA LONG and JOANA his wife? (Deed Bk. N). Thomas Winslow sold land to JOHN D. LONG in 1798. JOHN DUPRET LONG sold land to Charles Burrage in 1798 and also witnessed a deed in that year (Deed Bk. P). Thomas True and Mary his wife sold land to JOSHUA LONG in Berkeley Parish of Spotsylvania Co. in 1794 (Deed Bk. N) Elijah Ester conveyed land to Robert Hart and MARY LONG the wife of LEONARD LONG all of Spotsylvania County for love and affection (indicating that they were close relatives in all probability. Deed Bk. P) JOSHUA LONG witnessed a deed between Thomas

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Winslow and JOHN D. LONG in 1798. MARGARET LONG witnessed a deed in 1773 (Deed Bk. H). VALENTINE LONG was the executor for Lewis Pines' estate in 1788 (Will Bk. E).

In 1744, BLOOMFIELD LONG and MARY his wife sold land to Anthony Foster of St. George Parish. (Deed Bk. D). GABRIEL LONG of Culpeper Co. bought land in St. George Parish in 1789. (Deed Bk. M). In 1797, GABRIEL LONG and LUCY his wife (of Spotsylvania Co) made a deed of gift of land to their son JAMES. (Deed Bk. P). GABRIEL LONG was a witness in 1791. In 1795 he bought land from John Holladay. One of the witnesses was RICHARD LONG (Deed Bk. N).

In 1757, BLOOMFIELD LONG sold land to Samuel Simpson of Louisa Co. The land was in St. George Parish. In 1757 BLOOMFIELD LONG of St. George Parish, a blacksmith made deeds of gift of land to daughters Molly, wife of John Payne, Jr. and to SARAH LONG. This was the land on which he lived at the time.

In 1781, GABRIEL LONG and LUCY his wife of Culpeper Co. sold land (in Berkeley Parish of Spotsylvania Co.) to John Estige of Caroline Co. (Deed Bk. J)

Wills of Culpeper, Orange and Spotsylvania Counties have been mentioned above. There were wills of LONGS in a number of other counties. Among them were Accomack, Amelia, Augusta, Frederick, Isle of Wight, King George, Loudon, Lunenburg, Middlesex, Norfolk, Northumberland, Richmond, Shenandoah, Southampton, Surry, Sussex, Wythe and York. (Virginia Wills and Administrations).

A number of LONGS appear in the early records of several counties of Maryland. They were especially numerous in Somerset Co.

In the Revolutionary War there were numerous LONGS that fought in Virginia. Among the ones that had pensions were: (most soldiers died before they were ever able to draw pensions, which was in 1830 about): ANDERSON, BENJAMIN, BENJAMIN, DANIEL, GEORGE, HENRY, JOHN, JOHN, JOHN (wife MARY), JOHN (wife AMY), and JOHN (wife DELILAH), LEVI, MATHIAS (wife MARY), NICHOLAS, NICHOLAS (wife MARGARET), REUBEN, RICHARD, WARE (wife ELIZABETH), and WILLIAM. Others are listed in the DAR Patriot Index: ARMISTEAD LONG 1762-1831, wife ????? Greenough; BRUMFIELD about 1750-1823 wife Elizabeth Mitchell; CHRISTOPHER LONG; EVANS LONG 1759-1819 wife Lucy Apperson; GABRIEL 1751-1827 wife #1 Elizabeth Stubblefield, #2 Ann (slaughter) Stubblefield; JACOB; JAMES 1767-after 1820 wife Priscilla Laswell; JOHN 1755-1826 wife Elizabeth Bennett; JOHN about 1753-1829 wife Maria Whitzel; JOHN 1755-1828 wife Delilah Elliott; JOHN 1749-1832 wife Mary Haynes; JOSEPH; LAWRENCE 1756-1803 wife Priscilla Cogswell; NICHOLAS; NICHOLAS; PHILIP; REUBEN 1742-1791 wife Mary Harrison; RICHARD 1758-1848 wife #1 Sarah Hall, #2 Nancy ????; Sarah (Brown) widow of BRUMFIELD LONG.

REUBEN LONG of Culpeper Co. is listed as a soldier of the French and Indian Wars.

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WILLIAM LONG was an officer of the Virginia Militia from Culpeper Co., Va. He was born about 1760. After the revolution, he moved to Kentucky and was a neighbor to Daniel Boone. (Daniel Boone lived in Madison Co. for a time). This WILLIAM LONG married Mary Faulconer in 1797. He had one daughter named REBECCA LONG, b. 1799. (Vol. 45, p. 61, DAR). In Virginia Revolutionary Soldiers, a CAPT. WILLIAM LONG was listed from the State Line 16 April 1777 to 6 Feb 1781.

ELIZABETH LONG, wife of GABRIEL LONG was one of the legatees of Capt. Thomas Stubblefield in 1772 (Culpeper Will Bk. B). This GABRIEL LONG (1751-1827) was a Capt. in the 11th Virginia. He resigned in 1779. He later received a land grant. In 1825 when Lafayette visited America, he acted as his escort in Culpeper Co. (DAR, V. 74, p. 54). The descendants of this GABRIEL LONG have been the subject of several genealogy studies, but do not appear to be our line. He had (by his wife Ann Slaughter-who had first married a Stubblefield) a son NEROD LONG that married in 1807 to Rosa Foster. They also had JOHN SLAUGHTER LONG who married Elizabeth Foster. They also had a son THOMAS STUBBLEFIELD LONG, married 1806 to Bathsheba Moxley. (DAR, Vol. 107, p. 86) and GABRIEL LONG, JR. who married in 1805 to Lucy Slaughter. (His years were 1784-1810). (DAR, Vol. 99, p. 155.)

In the 1782-1785 and the 1782-87 Tax Lists of Virginia which have been published, there are LONGS from numerous counties. RICHARD, JOHN and ANN LONG lived in Orange Co. A number of LONGS that lived in Rockingham, Shenandoah, Frederick and Hampshire Co. were of German descent (LANG originally) and don't appear to be tied in to our group. Another large group of LONGS lived in Louisa Co. Their names do not generally match the ones in our family. The LONGS in Culpeper and in Caroline Co. do have names similar to ours. Spotsylvania Co. is missing from both of the Tax Lists mentioned. From Culpeper Co. the following LONGS were listed: ARMISTEAD, BENJAMIN, BROMFIELD, BROM, DANIEL, ERANT (probably EVANS), GABRIEL, GABRIEL, GABRIEL, GABRIEL, HENRY, JAMES, JAMES, JOHN, JOHN, JOHN, JOHN, JOHN READ, REUBIN, SAMUEL, SARAH, WARE (WM?), WILLIAM. In Caroline Co. there was JOHN, JOHN, JOHN, JOHN, NICHOLAS, and WILLIAM. RICHARD and WILLIAM were listed from Washington Co., Va., which is in present day Kentucky, as was a listing for a WILLIAM LONG in Lincoln Co.

A BENJAMIN LONG who died in 1857 in Allen Co., Ky. was born in 1777 and was the son of BRIAN (BRUM.?) and ELIZABETH LONG, and born in Culpeper Co., Va. His wife was the daughter of John and Mary Garrett and was also born in Culpeper Co. A LAWRENCE LONG died at the age of 76 years in Anderson Co., Ky. in 1854, (b. 1778) and born in Virginia. A WILLIAM LONG died at age 76 years in 1856 in Fayette Co., Ky. He said he was born in Ky. (B. 1780).

We know that GABRIEL LONG the father of WILLIAM P. LONG (see the write ups for them) was born in about 1785 in Kentucky (based on the 1880 census for WM. P. LONG in Lamar Co., Tx.) Further, there was a Jeremiah Perry the father of Gabriel Perry's wife who lived in Kentucky during this period. Gabriel and Elizabeth Perry were married in Lincoln Co., Ky. in 1804. Thus we know that our LONG family has its origin in Lincoln Co.

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A WILLIAM LONG shows up in the Tax List there in 1782-1787. In 1789, he is listed as having 1 male over 21, 1 from 16-21. In the 1795 Tax List he had 1 male over 21, none 16-21, and 1 negro.

A numbers of LONGS had land grants in Kentucky because they served in the Revolutionary War from Virginia.

Among these were ANDERSON LONG (1232 acres, Madison Co. 1798 survey); DAVID LONG (2100 and 1353 acres, Montgomery Co., 1798 survey); FRANCIS LONG (200 acres, Madison Co. 1797 survey); GABRIEL LONG (430, 570, 1176, 770, 716, and 336 acres, Military Grant, all 1792 survey); JOSEPH LONG (250 acres, Madison Co., 1793); 50 Military and Madison, 1792; 250 Lincoln, 1786; 250 Madison, 1793; 250, 250, 570, on Kentucky River, Bourbon Co. 1793); LAURENCE (870 acres, Harrison Co., 1795); LAWRENCE (8110 6020 Fayette, 1784 and 2500 acres Madison, 1795); REUBEN LONG (666, 1000 Military, 1784 and 1786); SAMUEL and JAMES LONG (1286, Bourbon, 1792 survey); WILLIAM LONG 1522, Military on Russell Cr., 1792; 400, same location, 1797; 1646, Wolf Cr., 1797; 430 Crocus Cr., 1798).

The last of these for WILLIAM LONG adjoined property (or survey) of Alexander Dicks. It was on Crocus Creek a branch of the Cumberland River. All of these surveys are given in metes and bounds land descriptions and are difficult to locate precisely. Many of the holders sold them and never actually occupied the land themselves.

Other grants and entries and deeds are associated with particular counties: ANDERSON LONG in 1808 had an entry in Warren Co.; RICHARD had an entry in Franklin Co. in 1839; THOMAS had one in Franklin Co. in 1816; WILLIAM B. in Woodford Co. in 1815; JOHN in Woodford in 1809; NIMROD in Franklin in 1816; ZACHARIAH in Woodford in 1815.

In Lincoln Co., WILLIAM LONG bought land from John Jones in 1804 (E-136) The land was on Dick's River (also spelled Dix in many records). He sold part of the land in 1805 (E-147). He sold land to Thomas Scott in 1803 (E-138). In 1816 he bought land from Reuben Ohlor on Buck Creek on the road to Stanford. (H-236). The record of 1805 indentifies the wife of WILLIAM as ELIZABETH LONG. In 1819 an inventory of the estate of WILLIAM LONG was made.

In Lincoln Co., BENJAMIN LONG married Nancy Menefee Dec. 19, 1796; BRUMSFIELD LONG married Lucinda Gooch in 1836; GABRIEL LONG married Betsey Perry Oct. 17, 1804; SPOTSWOOD LONG married Sally Harris in 1837; THOMAS LONG married Sarah Ann Gooch in 1837. William Adams married POLLY LONG April 3, 1797; and Hendrick Hutten married HANNAH LONG Sept. 5, 1785. In 1810, William Adams and William Adams, Jr. lived in Madison Co. (U.S. Census, Madison Co., Ky., p. 216). In 1821, MATTHEW LONG married Mariah Montgomery.

In the 1800 tax list for Lincoln Co. there were two LONGS: BENJAMIN and WILLIAM. According to the county history of Giles Co., Tenn. BENJAMIN LONG and his father-in-law, William Menefee, Sr. moved there in 1807-08 and if the birth place of WILLIAM P. LONG is correct, GABRIEL and ELIZABETH LONG had moved there before 1805. Only WILLIAM LONG shows up in the land records of Lincoln Co. The LONGS married there in the 1830's are probably from another family that moved there later.

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In the records of Fayette Co., Ky. WILLIAM LONG had a will in 1818. His wife was AGNES, his sons were WILLIAM, ROBERT, ISAAC, SAMUEL, ALEXANDER, and daughters ELIZABETH and Rebecca Smith. (Will Book D, p. 32). This is not our WILLIAM LONG however. A WILLIAM and a BENJAMIN LONG witnessed in Fayette Co. in 1789.

The Menifee family clearly ties the LONGS of Giles Co., Tenn. and later Limestone Co., Ala. with the WILLIAM and BENJAMIN LONG of Lincoln Co., Ky. In 1789 WILLIAM and NIMROD LONG were listed in the tax list. There were several Lincoln Co., marriages of Menifees: John Curran md. Bathsheba Menifee in 1796; Jared md. Sarah Price in 1797; James md. Nancy Hutch in 1797; Reuben md. Jemima Renfro in 1800; Jonathan Ridgeway md. Elizabeth Menifee in 1792. In the 1800 Kentucky Tax List there were James, Jarrat, John, Reuben, and William Menifee. Several were buried in the old Whitley Burying Ground near Stanford: Garrat (1724-1811, Rev. Soldier); James (1766-1819); Amanda (1805-1830); Nancy 1766-1817) and Elizabeth, wife of Moses Collier (1752-1836).

The Menifees also came from Culpeper Co., Va. although there were some that also lived in Spotsylvania Co. In 1744 John Menifee and Mary his wife sold land in Spotsylvania Co. to James Ball. (Deed Book D.) He witnessed a deed of Thos Poole of Culpeper Co. in 1754. William Menifee witnessed a deed in 1767.

Henry, Henry, James, Jarrat, and John Menifee were listed in the DAR Patriot Index from Virginia.

In Culpeper Co. Henry Menifee md. Nancy Hughes in 1797. John Menifee md. Lucy Partlow in 1795. Larkin Menifee md. Lucy Yancy in 1797. William Menifee md. Mary Strother in 1790. Marriages after 1800 have been omitted.

The LONGS of Culpeper and Spotsylvania may be closer related than would appear obvious as St. Marks Parish (Culpeper Co.) was formed out of St. Georges Parish (Spotsylvania Co.) in 1731. In 1740 St. Thomas Parish was made from St. Marks and in 1752 Bromfield from St. Marks. The name Bromfield later became mistakenly Bloomfield. It is not clear, but the name of several LONGS from that are is probably tied in. -END-

EDITOR'S NOTE: Somehow a page got out of place, this page should come after the words Rev. War from Virginia, perhaps after the name Sarah (Brown) wife of Brumfield on page 6. Here is the information on that page:

1818-after 1782; WILLIAM LONG about 1755-1814; and WILLIAM 1755-1822, Catherine Surface.

One JOHN LONG was born in 1737 in Londonderry Ireland (now Northern Ireland). He married Widow Jane Henry. He died in 1826 in Grainger Co., Tn. He married in 1763 near Staunton, Augusta Co., Va. He had children JOSEPH, JAMES, JOHN, ROBERT, NANCY, RUTH and LANE.

LAWRENCE LONG was born May 10, 1756 in Virginia. He died in 1803 near St. Louis, Mo. He enlisted in July 1777 and was with General Washington at the surrender of Yorktown. He received land on the Mississippi River on which he started a saw mill. He also received land (7000 acres) at Richmond, Ky. (Madison Co.). (Pension No. 46034, DAR?) He had children NICHOLAS, GABRIEL (married Elizabeth Lewis), WILLIAM, JAMES, JOHN, SARAH

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ANNE, ELIZABETH.

A NICHOLAS LONG fought in the Revolutionary War from Halifax Co., N.C. He was descended from LONGS that came from Culpeper or Spotsylvania Co.

REUBEN LONG, b. 1730 in Culpeper Co. (had to be Orange Co. at that time) md. Mary Harrison. He died after Dec. 29, 1791. He was with Washington at Valley Forge. He had children NICHOLAS (b. 1750), GABRIEL (b. 1751), NIMROD, EVANS, ANDERSON, FANNIE, PEGGY AND POLLY.

Another NICHOLAS LONG was born in 1754 in Caroline Co., Va. He enlisted in the war in 1776 while he lived in Caroline Co. (Caroline Co. is the next county east of Spotsylvania Co.) He lost a brother in the battle of Germantown. (Pennsylvania). He served until the siegle of Yorktown. After the war he lived in Caroline Co. until 1795 when he moved to Kentucky. In 1832 he lived in Fayette Co. and in 1844 lived in Campbell Co. He died there in 1846. His wife died before he did. He left three children: GABRIEL, who moved to Texas where he died, WILLIAM who also went to Texas, where he also died, and a daughter MARY H. who married Colwell and lived in Campbell Co., Ky. (Pension No. S-31222)

Another NICHOLAS LONG (Wife MARGARET LONG), lived in Knox Co., Tenn., when he applied for a pension in 1833. At that time he was 69. He was born in 1764 in Culpeper Co., Va. He lived there when called into service. He was discharged in 1781. He lived in Culpeper Co. for about 5 years after the war and then moved to Botetourt Co. and lived there about 20 years, then moved to Henry Co., Va., and later to Green Co., Tenn. and then to Anderson Co., Tenn. followed by Jefferson, Rhea and Knox Co. In 1844 his widow applied for the pension. She states that she was married to NICHOLAS LONG in November of 1778 and that he died July 1839. She married him in Culpeper Co., Va. Her children were BETSY, WILLIAM, JOEL, NANCY, SALLY, RACHEL, HANNAH, PEGGY, NICHOLAS, DICY and JAMES. A witness, Nancy Babbs says that in January of 1787 she and her husband JOHN LONG are their wedding dinner at the house of NICHOLAS and MARGARET LONG in Botetourt Co. and that JOHN LONG was a full brother to NICHOLAS LONG.

In the pension application another REUBEN LONG, he states that he was born in St. Mary's County, Maryland, about 1756, and lived in Culpeper Co., when he entered the service in 1775. He was in a number of battles and ended up in North and South Carolina where he stayed after the war. In 1828 he lived in Sumter Dist., S. C. In the 1800 census of S. C. there were also GABRIEL, JAMES, JOHN REED, and WILLIAM LONG (his brothers) living in Abbeville Dist., S. C. These are mentioned in the will of REUBEN LONG. He had a brother NICHOLAS that lived in Scott Co., Ky. and died before 1828. All this line was descended from RICHARD LONG that died in Spotsylvania Co., Virginia in 1761.

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GABRIEL LONG (1785 - 1836)

GABRIEL LONG, was the son of WILLIAM and ELIZABETH LONG. He was born in Lincoln Co., Ky. about 1785. He married Elizabeth Perry in Lincoln Co. on October 17, 1804. In about 1805 he and his wife moved to an area that became Giles Co. in 1809; it was probably Williamson when they moved there. In 1807 it became part of Maury Co.

In the Goodspeed's History of Giles Co. there is an account of William Menifee and his sons John and William and his son-in-law BENJAMIN LONG were early settlers in Giles Co. and were there from 1808 to 1809. BENJAMIN LONG was elected a magistrate in 1809. It is probable that BENJAMIN LONG was a brother of GABRIEL LONG and they probably moved to Tennessee about the same time. BENJAMIN LONG bought land in Giles Co. from John Calvert, Sr. in 1820. (Bk. E, p. 48). GABRIEL LONG bought land there from David Huddleston in 1817. (Bk. C, p. 230). Unfortunately, many of the records of Giles Co. were destroyed during the war when the courthouse was burned. BENJAMIN LONG came to Giles Co. from Lincoln Co. Ky. They travelled the Kentucky Trace and came over the Cumberland Mountains, crossed the Elk River near its head and settled near the state line opposite Elkton above the ferry. BENJAMIN LONG settled $\frac{1}{2}$ mile north of Elkton. In 1824 BEN LONG sold land to William Jones (Bk. F, p. 400). GABRIEL LONG served on a jury in 1816 in Giles Co. as did PATRICK LONG, also probably a brother. PATRICK LONG died in 1816 and left MARGRET, JAMES, WILLIAM, and POLLY LONG as minor orphans. German Lester was appointed guardian. In 1819 WILLIAM LONG sold land to CHARLES LONG (D-326). In 1824 BEN LONG sold land to William Jones (F-400) and BENJAMIN sold land to JAMES LONG (his son) in 1836 (M-70). AARON LONG sold land to Lewis Nelson (V-118).

In the 1820 census of Giles Co. BENJAMIN LONG had 1 male 10-16, 1 male 16-18, 2 males 18-25, and 1 male over 45 with 2 females less than 10, 1 female 10-16, and 1 female 26-45 and 1 female over 45. (P.6) In Limestone Co., Alabama, just across the line in Alabama, GABRIEL had 1 male over 21, 1 male under 21, 1 female over 21 and 4 females under 21. He had one slave. JOHN LONG had one male over 21, 5 males under 21, 3 females over 21, and 4 females under 21. He had 6 slaves. AARON LONG had 1 male over 21, 2 males under 21, 1 female over 21, and 1 female under 21. AARON and JOHN were quite likely related to GABRIEL and were probably brothers.

In an 1812 Tax list of Giles Co. are listed GABRIEL LONG next to his father-in-law Jeremaih Perry and to a John Perry. AARON LONG, PATRICK LONG, WILLIAM LONG were also listed in this same tax list.

BENJAMIN LONG did not die until after 1850. He is listed in the census as born in Virginia in 1770, and it is probable that the parents of GABRIEL and BENJAMIN did not move to Kentucky until about 1780. BENJAMIN fought in the War of 1812.

GABRIEL LONG probably moved to Alabama in 1818. He is listed in the census there 1818-1820. He was listed three listings from his mother in law Anney Perry. He bought the W part of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 27, Twp. 1 Range 6 west of Elk River. (120 acres). He sold this land to Simpson B. Flenagan in 1836.

In the 1830 census of Limestone Co. GABRIEL LONG had one son less than 5, 1 male 40-50, 1 female 5-10, 2 females 10-15, and 1 female 20-30. His son WM. P. LONG had married and was also listed (p. 25). AARON LONG was listed on p. 26. A PHILIP and DARLING LONG were listed on p. 11. They did not appear to be related.

MARGARET LONG, a daughter of GABRIEL LONG married Abner O. Paine Jan. 1, 1839 and ELIZABETH married James Coleman on the 21st of Sep 1835. (Limestone Co., marriage records).

The will of FABRIEL LONG was probated in 1836. (Wills Bk. 4, p. 619). He gave his wife ELIZABETH a tract of land on which he was living and five negroes. He had three small children, MELISSEY, MILTON, and REBECCA. He had children WILLIAM, ANN, MATILDA, MARGARET, ELIZABETH, MARGARET, (?) ELIZABETH?, MELISSEY, MILETON, and REBECCA. He named WILLIAM P. LONG and Samuel Flannagan as executors. John C. Harrison and Richard J. Andrews.

ELIZABETH, the wife of GABRIEL LONG lived until about 1853. In that year WM. P. and MILTON P. LONG were administrators of her estate.

WILLIAM P. LONG (1805 - 1889)

WILLIAM P. LONG, the son of GABRIEL LONG and Elizabeth Perry, was born in Tennessee, probably in Giles Co. on the 16th of June, 1805. His family moved to Alabama quite early, probably about 1818. WILLIAM P. LONG was listed in the 1830 census from Limestone Co., Al., p. 25. He had 1 male 20-30, 2 females less than 5 and 1 female 20-30. We know that he probably married about 1826 to Ann E. Harrison (family tradition) probably in Limestone Co., but the marriage is not recorded there. Many early Limestone county records were lost in courthouse fires. WILLIAM P. LONG was appointed a constable in 1832. He signed a deed of trust with George D. Perry in 1833. In 1836 when the father of WILLIAM P. LONG died, WM. P. was made executor of the estate. (Will Records, Limestone Co.) He was also the administrator of the estate of Jeremiah Perry along with John C. Harrison as he is security. (Vol. 98, p. 94. WILLIAM P. LONG was listed in the 1840 census from Limestone Co. (p. 163). He had 1 male less than 5, 1 male 30-40, 2 females 5-10, 2 females 10-15, and 1 female 20-30.

In the 1850 census, WILLIAM P. LONG and his family are included from Limestone Co. (U.S. Census, Dist. 4, Limestone Co., p. 28). He was 45, b. Tenn., with ELIZA ANN 40 b. S.C., ELIZABETH M. 22 b. Al., CLEMENTINE D. 19, ELENOR C. 15, JAMES P. 12, MARY 8, CAROLINE 6 and PERMELIA 4 (all b. Al.). He lived near his mother ELIZABETH (U.S. Census, p. 28). MILTON P. LONG and LONG sold land to Wiley B. Pepper in 1854 (Bk. 9, p. 296). MARTHA L. LONG (his sister). The land was the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of section 27 of Twp. 1 of Range 6 west. The deed mentions that one acre which contained the graveyard was excluded. The graveyard was near the west boundary of the land.

In 1853, WILLIAM P. and MILTON P. LONG were appointed administrators of their mother's estate.

In 1857 WILLIAM P. LONG was listed as a stockholder of the Memphis and Charleston Railroad Co. He had four shares listed at \$25 per share.

WILLIAM P. LONG and his family moved to Lamar Co., Tx. in 1854-55. They lived near Powderly.

In the 1860 census children CLEMENTINE D., JAMES P., MARY, CAROLINE, PERMELIA, HARRIETT and John Payne were listed and the next listing was Joseph Strange and his wife Martha, both 31, b. Al. Martha was almost certainly ELIZABETH M. of the 1850 census.

WILLIAM P. LONG was an officer in the Civil War and fought at the Battle of Pea Ridge (interview with Eula Seigler in 1958). In the Confederate records that I have been able to locate, I found four WILLIAM LONGS listed but I can't at present decide which is which: They are: 2nd Co. A, McCord's Frontier Regt., Corporal; Co. I, (or JO 30 Texas Cavalry, Pvt.; Co. G, 32 Texas Cavalry, Pvt.; and 15 Texas Cavalry, Crumps Btn., Mtd. Vols. If we could find out if any of these units were from Lamar Co., it might help to locate more information. According to family tradition, JAMES P. LONG, the son of WILLIAM P. LONG died of measles in the war. In 1870 Joseph Strange, Clementine Duff's husband, Elizabeth Popham's husband, and several others are missing from the census and apparently dead. Were they killed in the Civil War?

In 1870, WM. P. LONG and his wife, ANN E. (age 65 and 61) lived with Clementine Duff, John Majins, and J. M. Duff. (U. S. Census, p. 348, Lamar Co., Beat No. 4). Elizabeth Popham also lived there. An Alexander Mullins also lived nearby. Martha Strange was close by, based on the census. An ancestor of Dewel Smyers who later married the daughter of E. T. Seigler also lived nearby. His name was Eli Smyers. In 1870 Ellen Kennedy and her husband and Wm. M. and Mary Elizabeth Gilbreath lived in Collin Co. Another daughter married a Holmes, nothing is known of her.

WILLIAM P. LONG'S wife died in 1872 while visiting a daughter in Collin Co. She was buried there.

In the 1880 census, WM. P. LONG with two of his grand daughters and Clementine Duff and her children. They lived next to Martha Strange. He said that his mother and father both born in Kentucky.

WILLIAM P. LONG died on the 9th of March 1889 in Lamar Co. and was buried in the LONG Cemetery near Powderly, next to Eli Smyers. He had donated the land for the cemetery about 1872.

During much of his life, WILLIAM P. LONG was supposed to have been a school teacher. He was also a farmer. He was a Presbyterian and his wife was a Methodist.

MARY ELIZABETH LONG (1842-1925)

MARY ELIZABETH LONG, the daughter of WILLIAM P. LONG and Ann Elizabeth Harrison, was born January 3, 1842 Limestone Co., Al. She was listed with her father and her family in the 1850 census of Limestone Co. In 1855 the family moved to Lamar Co., Tx. She was again listed with her family in the 1860 census there in Lamar Co., Tx.

She married William M. Gilbreath in Lamar Co. on the 17th of December 1868. By 1870 they had moved to Collin Co. and were listed in the census there, near her sister and brother-in-law, George and Ellen Kennedy. They were still there in 1880. By 1885 they moved back to Lamar Co. One daughter, Eula Seigler was born there near Powderly.

In 1902 the William M. Gilbreath family moved to Clay Co. Wm. M. ran a store there. He died in 1913.

MARY ELIZABETH lived for several years after her husband died. She died on March 9, 1925 in Vashti at the home of her daughter Alma Adams. (Obituary, Clay Co. Leader). She was buried in the Joy Cemetery.

Page 322--A. L. Meek is a pioneer of California. He came to the State in 1850, and mined from that date until 1859. He then joined the United States Army, and during the war of the Rebellion did provost duty in California until 1865. At the expiration of that time he engaged in merchandising at Antioch, Contra Costa county, and later farmed in Colusa county. He came to Monterey county in 1874, and engaged in agricultural pursuits on the Salinas river bottoms and in San Miguel canon. In 1877 he turned his attention to the hotel business at Santa Rita, where he still remains. He is widely known as a man of strict integrity and of genial manner, and during his long residence on this coast has made many friends. He married, March 6, 1866 to Miss Lottie Leach, of Ione, Amador County, California. She is a native of Canada and came to this state with her parents when she was quite young. They have a son and daughter, Thomas and Etta, the latter is now Mrs. Dr. LONG, of King City. (Dr. LONG'S right name is Franklin Jesse and Mr. Meek's name is Abram Landren. F. J. LONG'S parents were Joseph Johnson LONG and Elizabeth Ann Stumph who were married somewhere near Wheeling, W. Virginia in 1857. noted by G. Blomquist.)

Page 388--F. H. LONG is well known throughout Monterey County as one of the leading citizens of Castroville, a successful dealer in real estate and the manager of the extensive interests of the Cooper ranch.

Mr. LONG is a native of Loraine County, Ohio, born November 7, 1849, a son of Joseph A. LONG, a farmer and dairyman by occupation, who was a pioneer of Loraine county and a native of New Hampshire. Calling into mind the Morality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain in this my last will and testament that is to say promiscuously and first of all I recommend myself into the hands of Almighty God who gave it a being and that hath preserved it to this present time, and I recommend my body to this earth to be buried in decency as in a Christian burial at the discretion of my Executors Nothing Doubling (Doubting?) but at the general Resurrection I shall reserve the same again by the Almighty Power of God, and as touching the world estate which it hath pleased God to Bless. One--In this life I give and dispose of the same thing in the following manner and form, First of all I allow all my just debts to be paid and all my accounts to be collected. Secondly--my lands I bequeath to my brother John LONG and my horse gun and shot bag, also to him an order on Abraham LONG for the price of sixteen killing hogs and two beef cattle that he sold of mine and one young mare that he sold to Wm. LONG and one note I hold on Willis Sullivan for fifty dollars. Also I bequeath to Jacob LONG the one half of all the present crop of corn, and all my farming tools and one third of all my hogs, also I bequeath to William Sage one fourth of my hogs, also I bequeath to my aged Mother the one half of the present crop of corn and the remainder of my stock of hogs and all my stock of sheep and household furniture and effects and one two-year-old mare. I likewise constitute make and ordain that the sole Execution of this my last will and testimony is that each family is hold their right to the things bequeathed to them in this my last will. Ratified and confirmed to be my last will and Testament, in witness whereof I have hereto set my hand and seal this nineteenth day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventeen.

Nicholas of Irish descent b. 12 Apr 1764 in Culpepper Co., Va. enlisted in the Revolutionary War 1 Apr 1781 in the neighborhood of Williamsburg, Va. He married Margaret, last name unknown, but thought to be Turner, on 5 Nov 1783. They moved to Botetourt Co., Va. (This county not far from western boundary adjoining West Virginia. Organized 1769. Census reports available 1810-1880. It was organized from Augusta Co. Finecastle is County Seat.)

Nicholas and Margaret LONG moved to Botetourt Co., Va. in 1786 and lived there until moving to Henry Co., Va., then to Green Co., Tenn. about 1792, then to Anderson Co., then Warren Co., then Jefferson Co., then Knox Co., then to Grainger Co., all in Tenn.

Margaret was born in Va. 1758. She applied for a pension in Jefferson Co., Tenn. in 1843 and again in Green Co., Nov. 25, 1845, where she may have died being 87 years old. She had a record of her seven children born in Virginia, but the dates were incorrect so she destroyed them when she left Botetourt Co., Va. She said she had eleven children.

Nicholas died 27 July 1839. He applied for his pension in Knox Co., Tenn. Aug., 1833. It was granted in Knoxville, Tenn. Witnesses were: Barnard Slaughter of Anderson Co., Tenn. and Southy Nelson of Knox Co., Tenn. Others listed were Mardia Yarnal, Robert Tindle and Lendsay Childre.

Margaret said they were married by publication of bann, according to the ceremonies and rules of the church of England or the Protestant Church, neither a license or marriage bond.

It is a pleasure as a recent subscriber to receive a copy of Our LONG Line. It is indeed long, reaching as it does far and wide in many directions.

My great-grandfather, William LONG, was a stockman and one of the leading cattle buyers of Warren County, Iowa, and lived on a stock farm near Indianola, the county seat. He was a leader in the community and in his church and his home was a center of hospitality and good living which was shared with many relatives and friends.

William LONG was born in 1825, a son of John LONG of Greene County, Pennsylvania, and one of a family of thirteen children. On the day that he was twenty-one, his father presented him with a horse and saddle, a large gold watch with a key, and fifty dollars in gold, and gave him a choice of staying home and working with his father, or going out into the world to make his way. William chose to leave, going first to Monmouth, Illinois where he fed cattle for a year, then on to Warren Co., Iowa. He was a large, strong man, but while young he met with an accident that caused increasing lameness, and he spent his later years in a wheel chair but managed his affairs quite ably, never the less. During his more active years he conducted his business affairs from his buggy which became known as "Uncle Billy's Office". Two of his brothers, Joe and Jesse LONG, both had large stock farms near Monroe, some miles from Indianola, Iowa. In early days, William rode a horse as they all did, bringing that custom and mode of travel with them, as that was their type of transportation back home in Pennsylvania; and the brothers would travel horseback across country from their country homes to visit one another. Their father, John LONG, had married Susan Gwynne, a direct descendant of Sir William Gwynne of Dorchester, England. The Gwynne-LONG record is documented in The Horn Papers, Volume 2.

John LONG was a noted horseman, providing each member of his family with their own mount; he erected a long stone barn which was known for many years as a local landmark. The brothers' grandfather and father of John LONG was Jeremiah LONG, who married Ann Jones. He was a Revolutionary soldier, and an early settler with a large family who lived in the Shenandoah Valley. A prominent family name was Isaac LONG. Other pioneers and early settlers were the family of Jesse Van Meter neighbors and friends. There were few white settlers living in that section of the wilderness at that time, and five families are recorded in the history of those days as early Americans who faced pioneer hardships and helped build our country.

Lasting friendships were formed among the early settlers and families named their children for one another. The Van Meters and LONGS remained friends through the years, and the Van Meter name of "Jesse" was handed down in the LONG family for generations, while Jeremiah LONG became "Jerry" in several families. In later years, as pioneering continued farther west, A Jesse Van Meter founded the town of Van Meter, Iowa. There are numerous descendants of Jeremiah LONG in Pennsylvania and in many other parts of the country. Among recognized LONG traits are often to be found, red or auburn hair and a ruddy complexion. The LONGS as I've known them are usually vigorous and lively and quite socially inclined.

William LONG married first Lucinda Frances Brown and after her death Mary Ashby. He died 1902. He has descendants living at present on the east coast, the west coast, and in the middle west.

I know! What a feeling of released frustration! I've asked Evelyn to insert a brief description of five years of searching for I think it will push many of you on.

Thru records of my ggf George Fitzsimmons LONG (death certificate, etc.) I ascertained that he was the son of John LONG and Harriett Fitzsimmons who lived in Pike Run Twp., Washington Co., Pa. By correspondence I found an expert geneologist in California State whose ancestor was Harriett's aunt and we compared and felt good on the Fitzsimmons lineage on 1786. Found many John's in 1850 census and tried to track them in the 1870 Census when George would be 8; however, much of the film was illegible. Sent a GSA Form 7029 (Order for Copies of Census Records) to National Archives which came back "Not Found". I had found John's death date on a Common Marker in a plowed-over, almost forgotten cemetery. Where to try next was a real problem.

Then, as we were on our way to Korea, my California friend took a research trip to Washington, D.C., went through the 1870 Census Records and found, dimly legible, my John LONG and family! Now I can move on. Here's my John LONG's family. Would appreciate hearing from his descendants.

Patrick Joseph LONG (born 17 Mar 1843, prob. Tipperary, Ireland) came to United States and settled in Louisiana. Family tradition says he served in the Confederate Army. In Louisiana, he met and married his wife, Mary Moore (born 24 May 1841, prob. County Cork, Ireland). Desire info. on county of residence in Louisiana probably 1860-1865. It is possible that Patrick Joseph LONG's parents (James LONG and Mary White, both born in Ireland) came to the United States with him; if so, desire info on their deaths. Patrick Joseph LONG and his wife Mary Moore must have traveled through New York state, as their eldest child, James E. LONG was born there in about 1865 (reported on 1870 and 1880 census). By 1870 they had settled in San Francisco where they lived until their deaths in 1910 and 1912 respectively. Six other children were born in San Francisco and were reported on the 1870 and 1880 federal census for San Francisco. They are: Catherine, b. 1867 m. Edward Murphy, d. c. 1913; Joseph W., b. c. Mary Ellen Treacy 1901, d. 15 Jan 1915; William G., b. c. 1878, m. Mary Conlon, d. Mar 1946. My great-grandmother, Mrs. John Currie Richmond of Caswell County, North Carolina was married in 1820 and died in 1839 at the birth and death of her youngest son, Joseph Armstrong Richmond. John Currie Richmond then came with his children, relatives, and servants to Oxford, Mississippi, where the family lived until well within my memory when we moved to Memphis. Betsey was the daughter of William and Mary Stephens whose will we have. She left small sums to her grandchildren and to her grandson, Dr. William Currie Richmond, who graduated in medicine at the University of Penna. in 1854.

Probably Mary's maiden name was LONG. Her mother, Elizabeth LONG, has left a will in Caswell Co., North Carolina, naming Mary LONG plus other daughters. It is interesting that she leaves \$50 to Monroe LONG. Other daughters listed are Elinor Whitlow, Sallie Rogers, and one named Riggs. She leaves money to the four orphan children of John LONG. Other grandchildren to whom she leaves money are Betsey Stephens, Katherine Hightower, Betsey Hodges, Robert LONG, John LONG, and Gabriel Hodges. This will was probated in 1815. Another will from that area shows Nathaniel Comer, a connection of my Richmond family, left \$50 apiece to the orphans of his daughter, Betsy LONG. Nathaniel's daughter Nancy married Daniel Richmond and came to Mississippi with John Currie Richmond. In several family wills William LONG is named as a responsible person in the settling of the estate. The DAR patriot index shows a William LONG to have had service in the Revolution. I wonder whether and where he fits in among these persons. If anyone can help with these LONGS from North Carolina, I'll be happy to exchange data.
